Action Plan for Jobs



- Since the Action Plan for Jobs was introduced in 2012, it has been one of the Government's key instruments to support job creation.
- It is a whole-of-Government initiative under which all Government Departments and Agencies work together to deliver on the agreed action points for each year.
- In continuing to support the finance for growth agenda for SMEs the Action Plan for Jobs contains a chapter on Finance for Growth.
- The focus in 2016 is to implement a series of actions to support Irish businesses to compete on an equal footing with their international counterparts.
- The Finance for Growth objectives for 2016 are to:
 - Ensure that viable SMEs continue to access appropriate finance at a reasonable cost from both bank and non-bank sources
 - Continue to roll out, monitor and evaluate State supports for SMEs, while facilitating the development of alternative sources of finance
 - Enhance awareness amongst SMEs and entrepreneurs of State business supports, both financial and soft, in order to raise their financial capacity in either starting a business, or in growing and expanding an established business
 - Engage with International Funding Institutions to optimise returns for Ireland



SME State Bodies Group

- The SME State Bodies Group, chaired by the Department of Finance and attended by Government Departments and State agencies with an interest in access to finance for SMEs, was established in 2012 to both, develop key policy initiatives to support SME access to credit and other forms of finance, and to ensure their implementation.
- The Group engages intensively in addressing issues associated with SME funding and financing in conjunction with relevant stakeholders.


